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
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


Read This Before You Teach!!!!

Welcome to Footsteps of Faith!

- Hebrews 11:6 tells us "...without faith it is impossible to please (God): for he that cometh to God must believe that He is, and that (God) is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him..."(KJV)
- Faith is a lost art in our cities. Our kids on our streets trust only what they see. They still believe in God, but they doubt that He can do specific things in their life. The only resources they have for figuring out things in life are themselves, and maybe their friends from church. Having faith in an unseen, mysterious God, and leaving a situation in His hand to work out, is a mind-blowing concept. It's too extreme, in most cases, for them to grasp. They'd rather go out and beat up their nemesis than trust God to deal with their foe in His time.
- Our title "Footsteps of Faith" was chosen for a specific reason. Faith is not going to be learned overnight. Learning it is going to be a life-long journey; but as we all know, every journey we start begins with one footstep. This week you have the opportunity to introduce young people to the first steps of that journey.
- As you lead your students into this journey, there's something I want you to remember. The best leader is someone who is out in front leading. Are you out walking the pathway of faith that you are instructing your students about? Are you relying on God to solve your problems, or merely telling your students to? If you are not practicing what you are preaching, your students will smell it out right away. They will see it is not real in you. And they will ignore the whole thing.
- In the weeks leading up to your VBS, as you prepare your lessons, prepare yourself. Examine your faithwalk. Are your walking in faith? Are you giving God space to work? Are you looking to Him for solutions instead of manufacturing your own? Look into your life. Learn these lessons for yourself. Make them part of your story. If you do, I'll guarantee that your students will come away with a better understanding of how a life of faith is to be lived.

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
Application:

Our lessons this week are going to be about faith. What is faith? Faith is what you had in the person that was leading you through the obstacle course. When your guide was telling you which way to go, what did you do? You turned in that direction? Why? How did you know that was the right way to go? You didn't. You had no clue where you were going.

When your guide told you to turn, you had to believe your guide. That is what faith is. Faith is believing in something that you can't prove. You couldn't prove that your guide was right. Instead, you just had to believe that what he was saying was right. You had to have faith that what he was saying was right. Does that make sense?

Now, when you were going through, which time was easier? The first or the second? Why? So you had an idea what was going to happen the second time? So how much faith did you have to have? More, or less? Now some of you, when you went through the first time, you thought your guide was going to run you off a cliff and kill you. On the second time, you weren't as scared of that happening, why do you think that was? You learned, after the first time, that there were no cliffs to fall off. Faith is scary like that sometimes. We don't know what is going to happen next. But the more often we have faith, the more we learn that it can be okay to have faith.

Of course, when we talk about faith, there is one more big part about having faith- the guides. Which guide did you like better for a guide? Why? So, some of you liked a guide who gave good directions and some liked a guide who you

knew, and some liked a guide who didn't yell at you. Those are all good answers. And they are the key to having faith. In this game that we did, if we didn't have guides, do you think we could have had faith? Absolutely not. The only faith we could have had was faith in ourselves. We would have had to make a guess about what we were supposed to do, and we would have had to believe that our guess was right. We'd have probably ended up tripping over a chair.

Now, we had to have faith to play this game. Do you think that there are other times that we have to have faith? What about when your math teacher teaches you how to do equations? Do you think that you might have to have faith that she knows what she is doing? Actually you do. You believe that your math teacher knows what she is talking about, so you do it the way she says.

Where else do you think we have to have faith? How about in God? How does God talk to us? You're right; He talks to us in the Bible. What kind of guide do you think God is? Do you think He's a good guide? I think He is. And that's what we're going to learn about this week. We have a whole bunch of stories about how God was a good guide.

Do you think Elijah thought God was crazy when God told him to go live in the desert? Do you think Elijah worried about where he would get his food? In a desert, it's hard to find food. All that is out there is sand and tumbleweed and cacti. However, Elijah did what God said. He trusted his guide. What happened? Did Elijah starve? Did his guide take care of him? Sure He did. Here is the thing to remember from tonight, "When God is our guide, we can trust Him to take care of us."

LESSON ONE: Elijah and the Ravens

YOUNGER BIBLE STORY

Long ago God sent prophets to tell His people what He wanted them to do. Elijah was one of these prophets.

At the time when Elijah was living, Israel (God's nation) had a very wicked king named Ahab. King Ahab did not care what God thought or said. He did many things that displeased God. He married a very wicked woman. He did not lead the people to worship and obey God. Instead, he built altars and worshiped an idol named Baal. He was the worst king the people of Israel ever had.

God was not at all happy with King Ahab. He was not happy about all the wicked things King Ahab was doing. So one day He sent the prophet Elijah to warn King Ahab. Elijah said, "As surely as the God of Israel whom I worship and serve is alive, there will not be any rain or dew for the next several years. There will be no rain until I say so."

What happens when it doesn't rain for a long time? Grass dries up. Trees lose their leaves. Food does not grow in the gardens and fields. The store shelves begin to get empty, because there is not enough food to fill them. After awhile food and water get almost completely used up. There is not enough food and water to keep people alive. Some people may even die because of hunger and thirst. When that happens, we say there is a famine. You may be able to find pictures of famine-stricken lands and people.

Of course Elijah's message from God made King Ahab very angry. He did not like God's message at all. He didn't want a famine in the land of Israel. But neither was he sorry that he was not obeying God. God wanted Elijah to be safe from King Ahab during the famine, so He told Elijah, "Go east of here and hide near the brook Cherith. You can drink from the brook, and I will send ravens to feed you there."

So Elijah obeyed and went to the Brook Cherith. There he stayed for a long time. He drank water from the brook, and ravens (big black birds like crows) brought him food. (*Talk about how birds feed their babies, by carrying food to them in their beaks. Don't let the discussion get out of hand, however, in thinking of the bugs and worms mother birds feed their little ones.*)

Of course the ravens didn't bring bugs and worms to Elijah. The Bible tells us they brought him bread and meat. Every morning and every evening, the birds came with his breakfast and dinner. Every day there was water in the brook for him to drink. While the rest of Israel was suffering from lack of food and water, God was taking good care of Elijah, because he trusted and obeyed God.


But one day the brook dried up, because there still was no rain in the land. What was Elijah going to do now?

CRAFT BAG RAVEN



You will need:

Black Craft Bags Black and Orange Construction Paper


Assemble your puppet: Glue the feather tuft to the top of the HEAD


Glue the eyes onto the HEAD just under the feathers. If you like, you can use wiggly eyes instead of the paper template pieces.

Glue the beak under the eyes. It will likely hang down over a little bit of the BODY. Make sure you just put glue on top of the beak (where it touches the HEAD) so you don't end up glueing the mouth shut.

Glue the wings into the FLAP. Glue the feet onto the bottom of the BODY.

Glue the tail onto the BACK.
